Advent is here. Let your face shine upon us, and we shall be saved. (Psalm 80:7) If you look at the readings for the first Sunday of Advent there is a mixture of acknowledgement of wrongdoing and asking for God's forgiveness. We also ask for encouragement to not let terrible things happening around us frighten us out of the hope that we have in Jesus. Paul affirms that it is God's grace that gives us the strength to endure and prepare for the revelation of Christ in and around us until that final day when all things will come to an end, and everything will be new and eternally good.

One of the themes of Advent is to keep awake. I was reading the words of Mark's gospel assigned for Advent 1 and once again got inspired by the line: Heaven and earth will pass away but my words will not pass away. Luther reminds us in the hymn "A mighty fortress is our God" that God's Word forever shall abide. In light of the keeping awake theme, I thought of God's word as an espresso shot (my apologies to the non-coffee drinkers). The Word helps us to stay alert. Mainly the idea is to discover Christ among us and follow His invitation to spread hope through our actions. Many of you participate in some kind of charity during this month, whether it is a Christmas present for a child that otherwise would have none, a warm meal for a senior, a card to someone who might be lonely or anything else you can think of. The Word always wants to lead you to believe that what you do matters and makes a difference and doesn't go unnoticed. So, take a little shot of that grace and mix it with lots of love and share it. That is what Christ is hoping for all of us.

As every year there are the typical holiday decorations that can help spread some cheer and encouragement. I like to think of these decorations as cheerleaders for us. While there are many things in this world that make us sad, mad, or questioning, if those reminders lead us back to the Word and the power of transformative love, we already have taken part in the Keep Awake movement of the spirit. Often, we need a little encouragement and if the ornaments and decorations don't do it you can read it in the words of scripture. God is letting his face shine upon us despite all the wrong around us and the wrong inside of us. When you see God's face of love you will become a believer (if you are now humming the Monkees song or feel compelled to put *Shrek* into your video player, I certainly won't keep you.) But if you feel like lighting a candle and pondering and praying over the Word that just won't go away and won't leave you alone, that is great too.

One of the best things about the church is that we don't have to do it alone. First, there is Christ who takes the first step with us, but then there is also the community of believers who are going through this life by carrying one another, upholding one another, and encouraging one another. When Paul speaks of grace, he always plants it strongly in the community and talks about how this grace is at work, was at work, and will be at work in the future. When we come together as a church in Advent, we light additional candles on the advent wreath to mark the passage of time but also to be reminded of God's presence in our lives as individuals and as a community. I saw the movement of the spirit in a recent service where a child was asked to lead a prayer and responded by asking for a prayer for family in the congregation that recently had lost a loved one. This is what we do, and I am so thankful for so much love.

The Advent and Christmas season are usually pretty busy and hectic. But my prayer is that we find time to sit down and sit with the word and with each other. The Word can come through the actual words of scripture heard in the service or read on your own or with others. It also can come through singing, whether by the fireplace, in a church pew, or on your couch or on your way to work. Keeping awake means to be touched by the word and to share the love that you see.

Highlights for December, besides the obvious Christmas Eve services on December 24 include carols around the fireplace, special choir music on Advent 2 and our celebration of Santa Lucia on Advent 3. For those that like a little treat and also want to spread some love to people in need there will be the annual cookie sale on December 17.

On December 9, we will once again host the Pages to Pirouettes production of *The Nutcracker*, a truly intergenerational experience on stage and in the audience with an ice cream social to follow.

Advent is one of my favorite times of the worship calendar, simply because it prepares us, as Lutherans, to rise above the cold and dark to instead feast our eyes on the spectacular views of stars, moons, and planets with which God freely gifts us with and to await with hope for the coming of the Star that will lead to Bethlehem.

While I treasure the joy we will find together in Advent, I can't help but sometimes experience the melancholy of the climate.

The climate of the changing weather, combined with the climate of suffering and sadness I see in the world.

Within these encroaching arctic winds, I am thankful for the warming solace I find within Scripture.

In my continued quest to read the entire NRSV Bible cover to cover, I encountered a prayer from the Book of Daniel I had never read or heard of before.

This prayer of praise, in Daniel 2:20b-23a, was made by Daniel after he was given vision by God to interpret the dreams of the Babylonian King Nebuchadnezzar.

²⁰ "Blessed be the name of God from age to age,

for wisdom and power are his.

He changes times and seasons,

deposes kings and sets up kings;

he gives wisdom to the wise

and knowledge to those who have understanding.

He reveals deep and hidden things;

he knows what is in the darkness,

and light dwells with him.

To you, O God of my ancestors,

I give thanks and praise,

for you have given me wisdom and power..."

I've felt strengthened by this proclamation of joy, especially since it comes from Daniel who as a captive exile in the court of Babylon should have very little reason to rejoice. Yet in the dark days to come, I can see this prayer continuing to give me peace.

Verses 20 and 21 remind me that God, my Holy Trinity revealed through Jesus Christ, is in all time and space and season. Therefore the Trinity is always revolving around me whatever the path I take, and I will feel warmed in spirit.

Verse 22 is symbolic for Advent. Not simply a waiting room for Christmas, Advent is a time to rejoicing together as a community under the bright stars in defiance of the cold and dark, both for the coming of Jesus and for the great love God brings.

Finally there is verse 23. Here comes the great symbolic interpretation I have of the Trinity, as a revolving wheel of light that has spun love for my ancestors and still gives me the same. All this done freely, for me, for us all.

As I contemplate this hopeful prayer during the start of Advent, I also consider a picture I took of the moon during Thanksgiving. The light from the moon somehow cut through the cloud cover, making it appear as if there was an eye in the sky. Consider the eye of our Triune God as it watches over us all, I pray it watches over all your family and friends, over all those in pain, who face discrimination born of hate and anger, over the houseless and cold, over victims of war, and most of all for you. May our prayers of praise cut through the pain of the world, and bring us warmth as we await the Star of Bethlehem. Amen





Special Music for December MY PERFECT STRANGER by Bob Chilcott Sunday, December 10, 2023 for both the 8:00 and 10:30 worship services.

The St. Paul's Chancel Choir will present a special music offering for worship on **Sunday**, **December 10**th. Bob Chilcott's **My Perfect**

Stranger is a three-movement work with harp accompaniment.

My Perfect Stranger was inspired by the children's book *How Many Miles to Bethlehem?* which was given to the British composer Bob Chilcott by his friend Kevin Crossley-Holland. Chilcott was asked to write a Christmas piece for the BBC Singers and decided to use the text of this story. This he punctuated by inserting the Christmas choral refrain "By by, lully, lullay" – 11 times!

He then asked Kevin to write a text for a *Prologue* and *Epilogue* to frame the retelling of the Christmas story. This is the text, especially the *Epilogue*, that also connects us to the journey, the hope, the promise of Advent. And the question asked, *Which role will you choose? What have you to say and sing?* should go with us beyond the Christmas season.

This work was premiered by the BBC Radio 3 at Milton Court, London on December 13, 2016, with Bob Chilcott conducting. A copy of the text is printed below. This is a beautiful Advent/Christmas reading and inspiration.

Prologue

This is what happens. This is how it begins.
Another census is underway, another round of taxes in Judea: each man with his wife in his own city, each of their children, and each baby, and at no worse time for a queasy virgin and her old husband, a carpenter.

Rough tracks through rocky hills, sand and shimmer on the Roman road, they're making slow progress from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

Mary's son is leaping in her womb, how eager he is to be born, to be born.

The city's a hellhole. Seething and shouting. Stinking passages. Beggars, tricksters, refugees.

My Perfect Stranger

Quick and slow.

Tight as a drum.

I'm round as lady moon calling to me.

My baby will be born tonight.

Innkeeper

Sorry, mate.

Not a single pallet.

Tell you what!

As in mazy moonlight to a pool, unblinking, face to face with who we are, and may become. In this story there are parts for each of us, God's creatures, parts for ev'ryone. Which role will you choose? What have you to say and sing? Dear dust and eternal.





SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE-Compliments of Lois Circle

INGREDIENTS



- 4 cups sweet potatoes, cooked and mashed
- 1 cup brown sugar
- ½ cup half and half
- ⅓ cup butter, softened
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 ½ teaspoons salt

TOPPING

- 1 cup brown sugar
- ⅓ cup flour
- 1 1/3 cup pecan pieces
- ½ cup butter, melted

PREPARATION

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F and grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.
- 2. In a large bowl, add sweet potato, brown sugar, half and half, butter, egg, vanilla, and salt. Beat with mixer until completely smooth.
- 3. Transfer sweet potato mixture to the prepared baking dish and spread into an even layer.
- 4. In a small bowl combine sugar, flour, pecan, and melted butter until a crumbly mixture forms. Sprinkle over sweet potatoes.
- 5. Bake for 35 minutes, then allow dish to cool for a minimum of 20 minutes before serving.


