The event features great food, beer, silent


auction with great deals, and, back by popular demand, the German Dancers and Cassidy Dance Studio dancers.

While Jesus is known for being our healer and redeemer, I like the fact that he was often found with others in community when he was living with us on earth.

He saved the wedding party at Cana from being an embarrassment for the bride and groom by providing the best wine in large quantities. He invited himself to the house of a tax collector and had dinner with all the people gathered there. He gathered with his disciples in the Upper Room on the night before he was betrayed by one of his closest friends.

He made sure that a huge crowd that had come to see him and hear him preach would not have to go home and was fed not only with his divine presence but also with enough food so that there were plenty of leftovers. The message in this is that there is always more room at the table and as the invitation continues to grow closer to us when we start sharing in God's name, the more we listen to God and the more we take God's grace into our hearts.

As we begin a new program year in September those examples of Jesus which we follow can provide an inspiration for us as a congregation. There are so many different ways that we gather with other people, certainly for Sunday morning worship, but also in many different circles and groups throughout the week. The council gets together to plan and evaluate our ministry and challenge us to think about how we can best support what Jesus is calling us to do. Our staff works hard to facilitate meaningful ways of doing ministry together.

As a congregation we believe that we have much to offer to future pastors and hence we have a new intern, Vicar Daniel Marrone, for this year. The new vicar got his first taste of ministry during late August through our music camp, which presented the musical *Rescue in the Night ... The Story of Daniel in the Lions' Den*. What a beautiful way for this Daniel to start his ministry for children from St. Paul's and the community.

These musicals are always a great way to remind us of how God has been present for people before us and how we can learn from their experiences. While some of us might be skeptical about the biblical Daniel's chances of survival in the lion's den (kids, don't try this at home – as Matthew says, you shall not put God to the test!) it is clear that people of faith had plenty of

experiences that defy the typical patterns of life and can only be attributed to the work of a loving God sometimes providing rescue out of a seemingly impossible situation.

This is as true today as it was for the Daniel of old. We easily forget to give thanks to God for whatever good has happened in our lives. The stories of the Bible help us to remember, to pause and to share the fullness of that thankful heart in blessing others in word or action.

This can happen in so many ways, but in the month of September it happens at St. Paul's with the return of Sunday School students who will be making hygiene and flood cleanup kits for Lutheran Disaster Response. I also happens through our choirs, who will once again inspire us through their songs. Our annual Oktoberfest will once again bring the community together so that others who have been struck by disaster can be helped and be blessed with the same hope that is in us. (I pray that many of you can participate in the Oktoberfest as volunteers and attendees.)

During our summer staff retreat we talked about the possibility of renewing our small group ministries. I would encourage you to take the month of September to think about a small group you would like to lead or see at St. Paul's. The best small group is one that has a definite beginning and end. This will hopefully make it easier for people to commit to lead and participate.

You may recall that we started a Pickleball Explorers group over the summer. It was a lot of fun and our participants were blessed by our time together. A small group can be anything you are passionate about. It doesn't have to be happening at church.

If you have an idea, please don't hesitate to share it with me or Vicar Daniel. While we won't be leading those small groups, we would be happy to support you in getting it started. We are hoping to have a Small Group Launch Sunday sometime in October. Please watch for announcements.

Last but not least, I want to reflect on the big sporting event that occurred this summer in Paris. I don't think I watched any of the Summer Olympics in Tokyo four years ago, but somehow, I found myself watching a lot more of the games in France this year. Maybe it was the City of Light that did it, or maybe it was this image of the world coming together in peace.

Despite their different backgrounds, faiths, and convictions all those Olympic athletes, and the world watching them, joined together. The athletes gave their best and we cheered them on. While we were proud of all the athletes from our country that came home with medals, I found that observing participation and following the Olympic spirit was just as important to me.

I loved the balloon that was raised in the sky with the Olympic flame. This could just as easily become a fitting image for us as Christians, illustrating how the flame of the Holy Spirit unites us and guides us to give our best for the community that God has put us in. It is not about winning, but about participation and giving our very best despite our many differences.

My hope for the coming year is that we can come together and shine so that our church and our community, as well as our world, can be blessed through us.

As we sang in the musical, lift up your heads and sing, sing, sing to the one true king.

May our voices be heard, and our actions be blessings.

From the time seven years ago when I first began discerning a call to ministry, the Holy Spirit has led me through the doors of church sanctuaries, seminary classrooms, hospital rooms, and now through the doors of St. Paul's.

My journey with you all has only just begun, and I am only beginning to get to

know all of you. But if the experience thus far is indicative of the experiences to come, then I have no doubt that this year of vicar internship will be one of abundant blessing, grace, and learning -- both for myself and, I hope, for those whom I serve.

When I reflect on the journey that brought me to St. Paul's, I see that despite all of the very different places and faces there is one constant which has followed me throughout: music.

From the *Minecraft* soundtrack which got me through the hundreds of pages of papers I wrote in seminary (and which still serves as the background music for every sermon I write to this day), to the Townes Van Zandt tunes I sang to myself during those challenging few months as a hospital chaplain, music has been not merely a source of entertainment, but a source of comfort, companionship, and connection to God.

As I'm sure you all know, St. Paul's is a profoundly musical congregation -- as this week's Summer Music Camp has shown! Indeed, this was one of the primary reasons I felt so drawn to this place.

When people think of music in church they may think only of hymns, but the entirety of our Sunday worship is full of music (such as the Kyrie and the Psalm). The important role of music in our worship isn't just a matter of personal taste but is actually a profound statement about the kind of God we are worshiping: a musical God! Even Paul (from whom our church derives its name) writes that if we are to be "imitators of God," then we ought to be "... filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord with in [our] hearts." (Ephesians 5:18-19).

There is something about music which connects us to what is most sacred. (Maybe some aspiring theologian-musicians in the congregation can help explain this mystery to me.) Sometimes people think that only certain types of music have the potential to be sacred, or to connect the listener to God in some mystical way: for some it's classical music, for others it's worship music. Both of these are rich musical genres.

But I think focusing exclusively on these genres misses something. All one has to do is glance at the Book of Psalms, that collection of ancient prayer songs, to see the full spectrum of music represented: there are happy songs (Psalm 96), incredibly sad songs (Psalm 88), and angry songs (Psalm 109).


The music which connects us to God comes in every form and is found in every genre. When you are deeply moved by a song, it is because the music sings the prayer that was hiding in your heart the whole time, the prayer that you couldn't put into words or, perhaps, didn't even know was there. So, when you hear that prayer sung or played aloud, with or without words, it's as if you are lifting it up to God yourself.

Even prior to my journey into ministry, music has followed me wherever I have gone. The memory of each chapter of my life is inextricably tied to the names of artists and albums that have filled those experiences with meaning.

When I think of my childhood, I think of the songs of tenor Andrea Bocelli that my mother would play through the house on Sunday mornings as she cooked my grandfather's recipe for pasta sauce, meatballs, and sausage in preparation for dinner (being Italian certainly has its perks). When I think of my youth, I think of the many guitarists my older brother told me to listen to as he taught me the basics of blues guitar: Muddy Waters, Buddy Guy, John Lee Hooker, B.B. King, Eric Clapton, and Stevie Ray Vaughn. When I think of my adolescence, I think of albums by Nirvana, Slipknot, Soundgarden, and Stone Temple Pilots that my older brother and I would play at full volume as he drove me to school. I could go on, but you get my point: I carry in my heart all of the music from the best (and worst) times in my life.

I pray that we never take the musical gifts of this congregation for granted. I pray that you all find the music which sings your hidden prayers. And, lastly, here at St. Paul's may our songs to the Lord be our prayer, always.



Peach Baked Oatmeal

Ingredients

- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 ½ cups unsweetened plain almond milk
- 1/2 cup dark brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons unrefined coconut oil, melted
- 1 tablespoon grated orange zest
- 2 tablespoons orange juice
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon salt

- 2 ½ cups old-fashioned rolled oats
- 2 cups sliced peaches

Directions

Preheat oven to 375°F. Lightly coat a 7-by-11-inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Whisk eggs, almond milk, brown sugar, coconut oil, orange zest, orange juice, vanilla, cinnamon, baking powder, nutmeg, and salt together in a large bowl until smooth. Fold in oats and peaches. Pour the mixture into the prepared baking dish.

Bake until golden brown and set, about 40 minutes. Let cool for at least 10 minutes or up to 2 hours. Serve warm or at room temperature.
